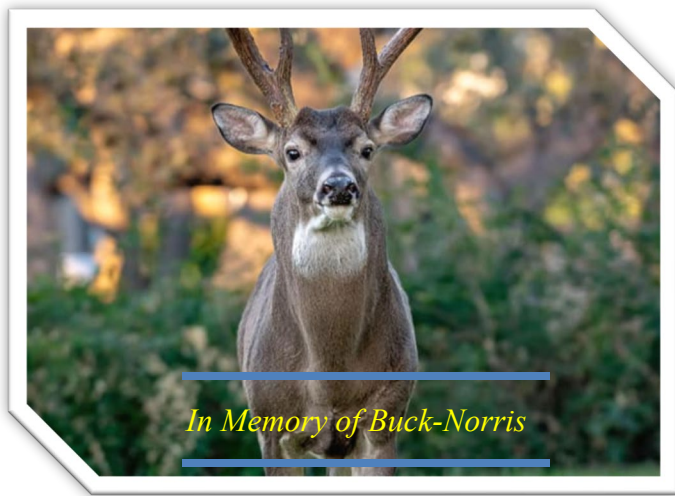

INTRODUCTION



We are pleased to present to the City Council and citizens of Hollywood Park the annual report for the year 2024.

This is the 12th year of my tenure as your police chief and I pledge to continue to strive to develop and maintain the professionalism of our staff and to provide excellent law enforcement service to the citizens in addition to maintaining the physical property of the police department and facilities in a fiscally sound manner.

The responsibilities we are tasked with are varied and complex, and include responding to citizen calls for service, impartial enforcement of the law,

apprehending violators, investigating criminal offenses, and providing security for the municipal court.

Just like the past few years, we continue to deal with the recruitment and retention of qualified individuals and all the challenges associated with those efforts. These challenges were presented to our elected officials during the budgeting process and a new pay scale was introduced and approved. This is an important step in retention, and we will work diligently to ensure we are an attractive department for those looking to serve in uniform.

As a new federal administration takes over at our nation's capital, we anticipate many changes including a renewed focus on immigration enforcement and how those efforts will impact how we interact with our federal law enforcement partners. This is not a new concept for us in the enforcement business as we have always had to adjust to new legislative requirements. Rest assured we will continue to serve respectfully and lawfully when it comes to enforcement and will handle every situation or individual according to State and Federal Law.

We continue to be part of the DEA narcotics task force in San Antonio as our officer continues to work side by side with federal agents in the war on drugs. To date, our officer has been involved in seizing more than 6.6 million dollars' worth of cash and assets.

On a lighter note, this past year we were fortunate to witness a total eclipse of the sun which was a rare treat, although brief, for our employees and residents who had an opportunity to witness the moon's shadow completely covering the Sun. The sky darkened as if it were dawn or dusk and hopefully, you all got to witness it as well.

Your Police Department is dedicated to serving you in the spirit of customer service and problem-solving, addressing those issues of crime and quality of life that are of concern to all of you. The feedback and support that we receive from the citizens is greatly appreciated and makes our job much easier.

On behalf of all the officers and staff of the Police Department, we thank you for the opportunity to serve you this past year.

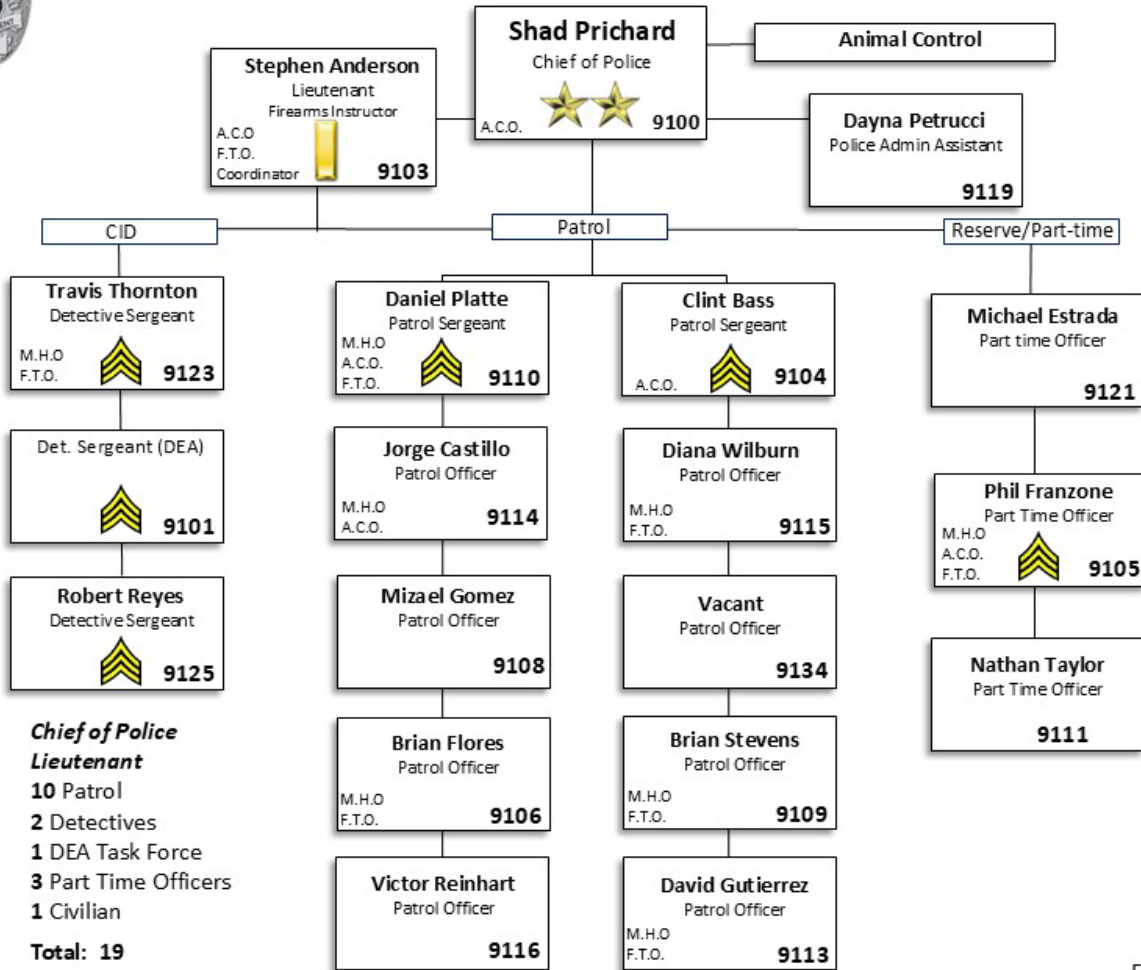

ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

The Hollywood Park Police Department, *when fully staffed*, is supported by a staff of 18 individuals. There are 15 full time commissioned officers, 2 Part Time commissioned Officers and 1 civilian staff member. The Hollywood Park Police Department has a budget of \$1,603,299.00.

PATROL DIVISION

The patrol division is comprised of a staff of 11 full-time employees and 3 part-time employees. Patrol officers are directly supervised by a Lieutenant and 2 sergeants.

The Hollywood Park Police Department Patrol Division provides 24-hour coverage and protection within the city boundaries of Hollywood Park as well as assisting other surrounding law enforcement agencies.

Patrol Officers are responsible for investigating all types of criminal activity, making required comprehensive reports, and filing appropriate charges in an attempt to deter criminal activity.

They also apprehend violators and target potentially hazardous activities and areas for enhanced enforcement efforts. The patrol division made **41 arrests** during 2024 including **4 arrests for DWI**.

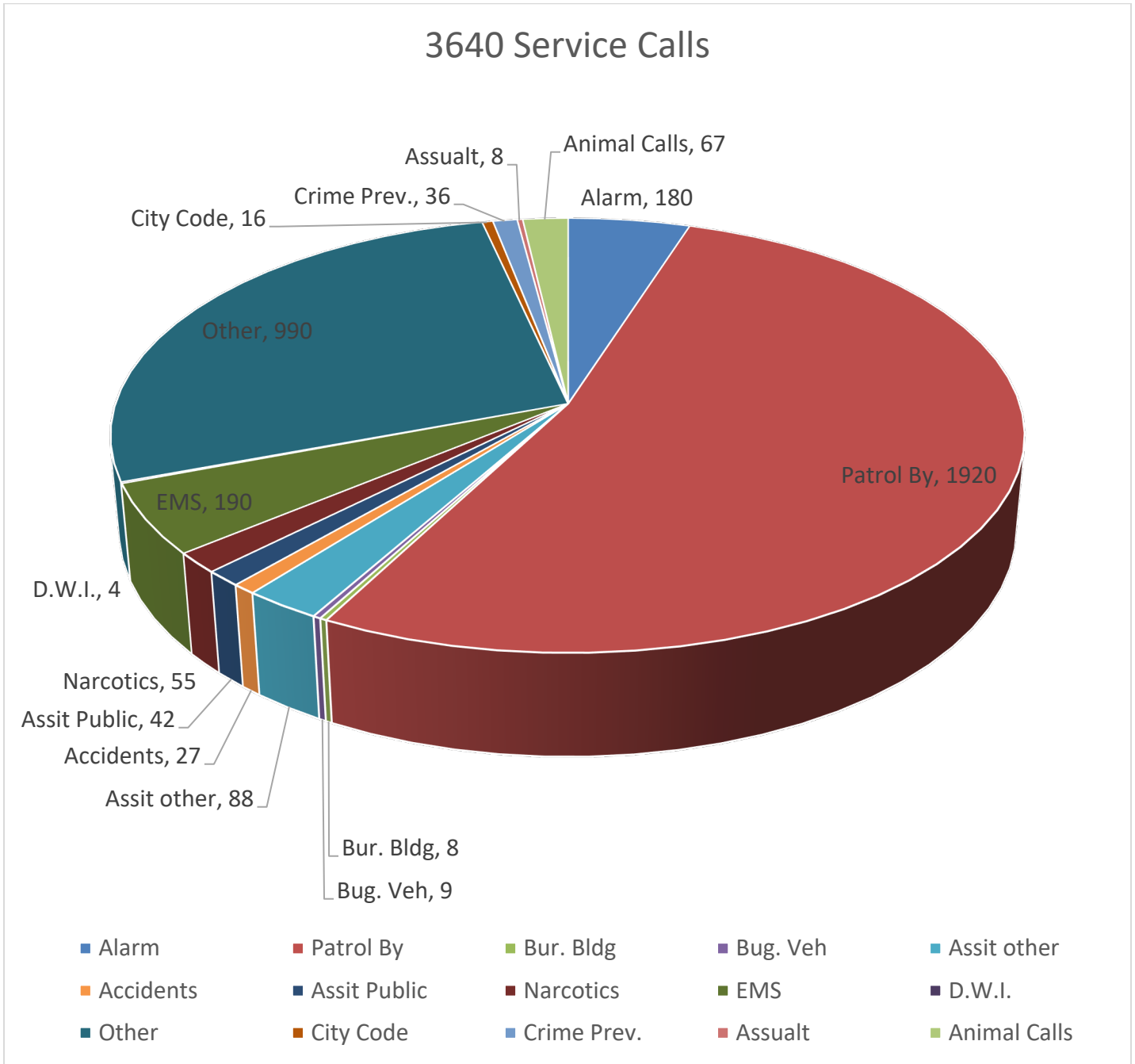
Patrol Officers respond to and investigate traffic accidents and issue citations in an attempt to make our roadways safer for our citizens. Officers responded to **27 motor vehicle accidents** and there were **0 traffic fatalities** in Hollywood Park.

Officers issued **5,414 citations** and **2,743 warnings** for traffic and other minor violations.

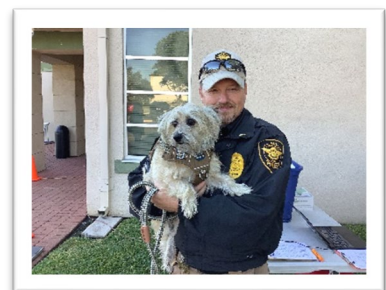
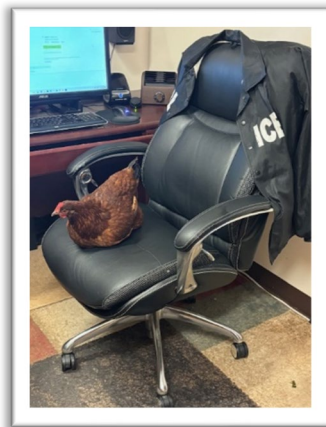
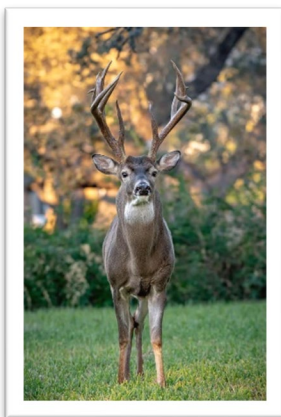
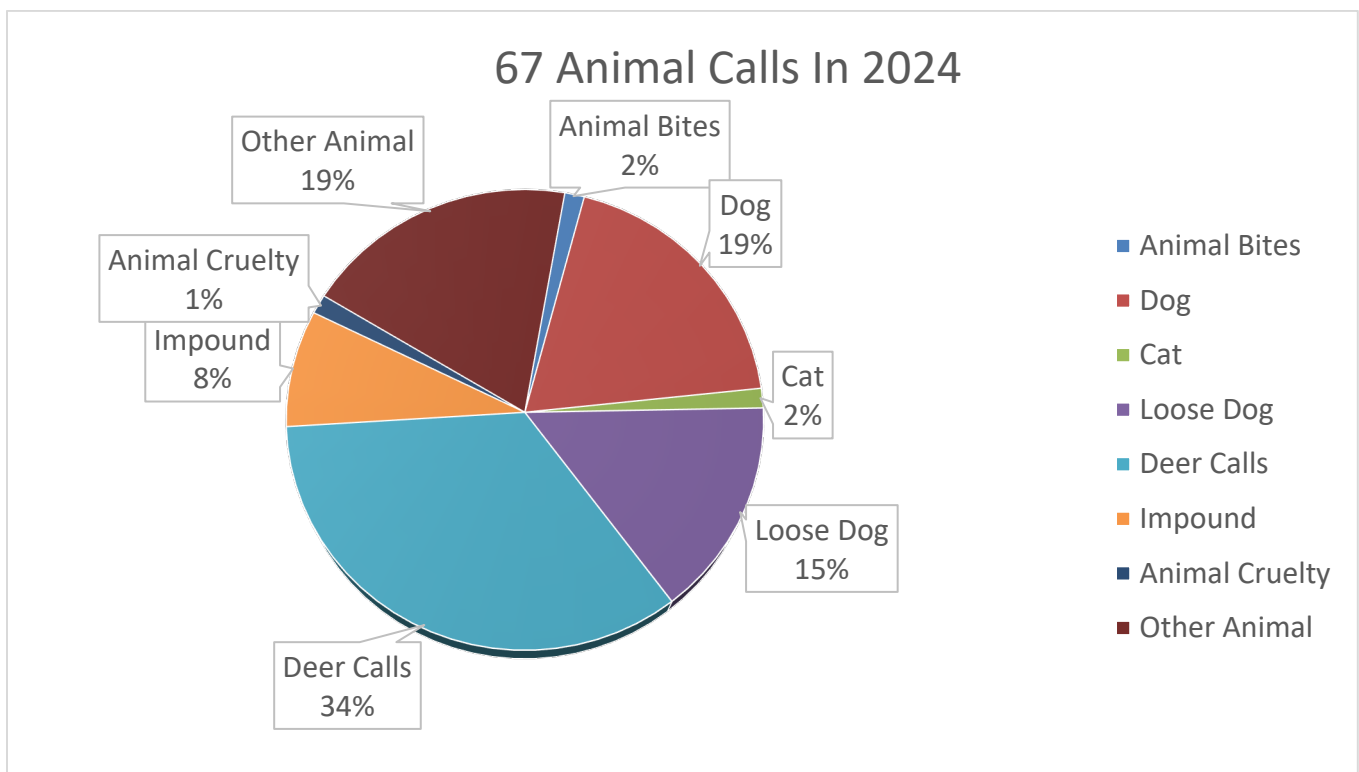


ANIMAL CONTROL

The Hollywood Park Police Department is responsible with enforcing animal control regulations and violations within the city. Currently, we have four police officers certified by the State as Animal Control Officers and all have extensive backgrounds in dealing with wildlife and domestic animals.

The Animal Control enforcement personnel assist the public with any animal-related problem. We provide the animals we handle with humane care and assist with sick, injured, stray, or unwanted animals. We also handle domestic animals or livestock that run loose and cause a public nuisance.

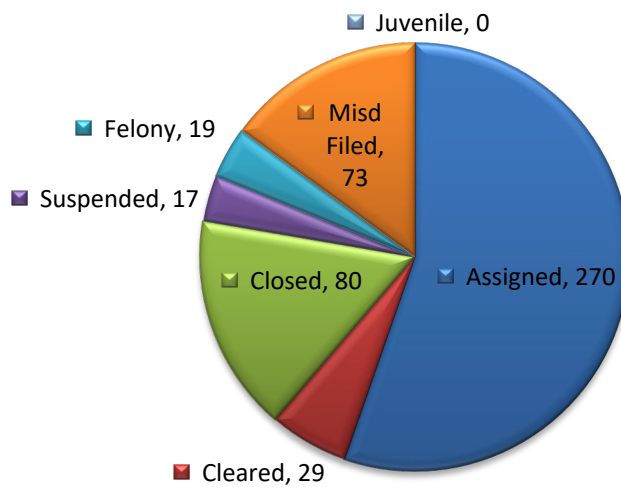
We work with outside agencies and the Hollywood Park Humane Society to ensure residents comply with the City's animal codes to maintain public health and safety. We also work with state departments for testing and reporting animal bites and rabies testing.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1. Worked with area law enforcement agencies and participated in numerous task forces such as US Secret Service electronic crimes, DEA Drug Task Force, Bexar County Human Trafficking initiative and others.
2. Completed and was awarded numerous grants to include new in-car camera systems, new body-worn cameras for officers, new rifle-resistant vests and ballistic shields.
3. Purchased replacement patrol unit with drug seizure funds.
4. Replaced all workstations and desk with donated desks, file cabinets and chairs thanks to Mayor Drash's generosity.
5. Contracted a private company to assist in liquidating surplus equipment and seized assets. Thus, freeing up city employees to focus on other important tasks and freeing up valuable storage space for departments.
6. Worked with local HWP Humane Society to place several impounded animals with forever homes.



7. Continued to be part of the DEA drug take-back program. HWP has been the top collection point for several years and has collected thousands of pounds of unused medications.



8. Our Facebook continues to be an invaluable tool to keep our citizens well informed and to date we have over 2,067 followers and are ranked #6 in performance as compared to other agency pages. We have also achieved a perfect 5 out of 5-star rating from citizen reviews.



9. The State requires every officer to go through active shooting training (ALERT) in response to the failed efforts of Uvalde school shooting incident. In light of this requirement, we sent a supervisor to get trained as a certified ALERT Instructor. He now trains all of HWP staff as well as other agencies including DPS which satisfies the legislative requirements and then some.



10. Using seizure funds, the department invested in a small drone and sent an officer to a drone certification course. We are still in the “learning and development” phase of our drone program however it is noteworthy and exciting to explore this technology.

11. For the fourth year in a row, Hollywood Park Police Chief Prichard was invited to be part of a criminal justice panel for the San Antonio Master's in Leadership program along with US Marshall Susan Parmeleau. This particular day was part of the Class regarding history, government, and Criminal Justice Day.



12. Chief Prichard, as the past President of the Alamo Area Police Chief's Association, continues to serve in a consultant role and is fully engaged in supporting this organization. This association continues to grow in its function, scope and represents the AACOG



Region at the State and Federal level. The association encompasses Federal, State and Local Law Enforcement leaders from the FBI, DEA, US Marshall's Service, County LE as well as the numerous smaller municipalities in and around Bexar County. This past year Chief Prichard had the opportunity to meet and discuss issues at the State Capitol with numerous State Representatives and Senators during "Chief's Day" in Austin.

Conclusion

Over the past 5 years, the Hollywood Park Police Department has handled **22,468** calls for service, made **106** arrests **20** of which were for driving while intoxicated (DWI), completed **114** accident investigations, and issued **10,320** citations along with **9,888** warnings. (See attached spreadsheet for more detailed information). Our goal is, as always will be, to increase enforcement activity and decrease criminal activity in the city to continue our trend of low crime and exceptional police services.

Our detectives were assigned **1,227** criminal cases to investigate and to file with the Bexar County District Attorney's Office.

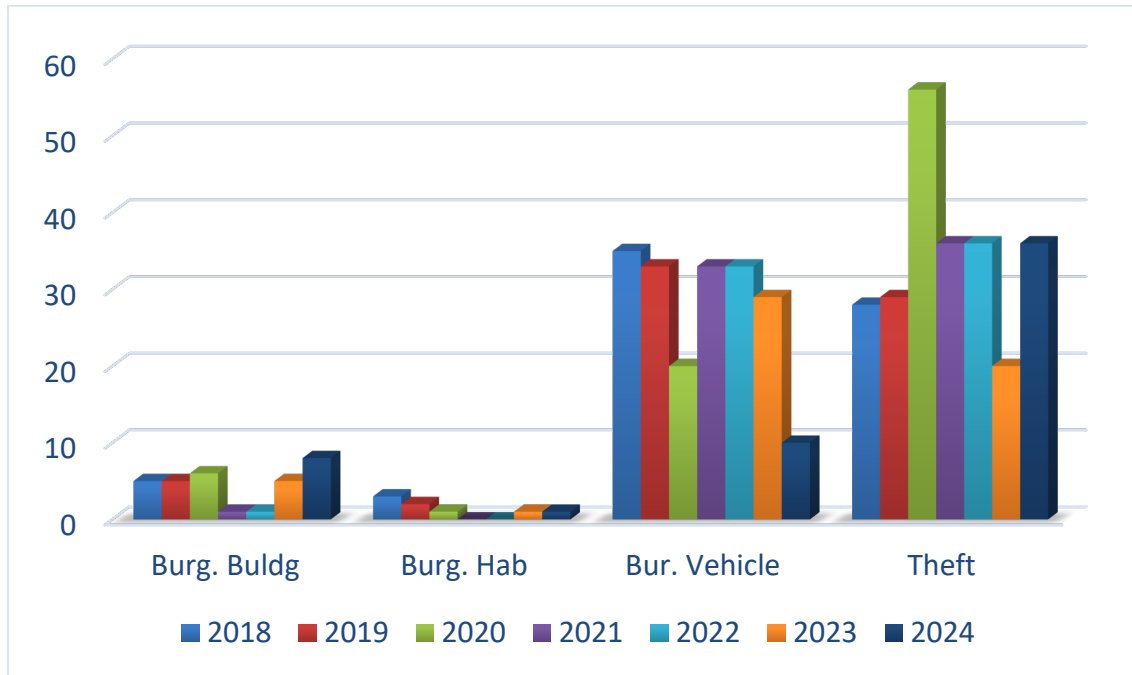
